Creative Commons at Tufts

Occasionally, staff and faculty at Tufts may wish to allow copyrighted works that they have authored, or to which they have contributed, be made widely available for use and redistribution.

"Creative Commons" ("CC") is a type of copyright license that allows users to redistribute a copyrighted work, subject to certain limiting terms. The seven types of CC licenses are standardized across the internet, granting both copyright holders and redistributors a high degree of clarity as to what they can and cannot do under certain "flavors" of CC. By applying a CC license to a given work, authors can easily promote redistribution of their work with minimal paperwork, and without sacrificing control over certain important types of use.

Of the seven types of available CC licenses, Tufts recommends the following:

- Attribution-Non-Commercial-No Derivatives: This license allows users to use the original work and share it with others, as long as they provide credit to the original work. They cannot change the original work or use it commercially. This is the most restrictive CC license.
- Attribution-Non-Commercial-Share Alike: This license allows any other person or entity to remix, tweak, and build upon the original work for non-commercial uses, as long as they credit the original work and license their new creations under identical terms.
- Attribution-Non-Commercial: This license allows any other person or entity to remix, tweak, and build upon the original work for non-commercial uses. Their new work must be non-commercial and acknowledge the original work, but they don't have to license it under the same terms.

Tufts does not recommend CC licenses that allow for commercial use of the original work. Please be aware that entering into a CC license that allows commercial use grants any other person or entity the right to sell your work for commercial gain, with your name connected to that work.

When considering whether to apply a CC license to a work, consider whether it is a suitable means of licensing your content. Some journals do not accept content that has been published, or otherwise made publicly available, previously. CC licenses are not suitable for works that you hope to publish in a journal, or for works that you hope to license commercially, as these licenses negate the content owner's ability to offer an exclusive license to the work. CC licensing cannot be used if you do not control the rights to all of the content in your work. For software, CreativeCommons.org recommends that open source licenses be used instead. Please consider all of the above information before applying for a CC license.

Faculty at Tufts retain ownership of their rights in copyrighted work, except in limited circumstances, such as works that were developed under a funded project; works directly assigned by the University; and works developed using substantially more Tufts resources than would normally be provided (please see the Tufts University Intellectual Property Policy for further details). Faculty who wish to place their individually-owned works under a CC license independently should follow the guidelines available at CreativeCommons.org. If a faculty member is not sure of who owns the work, please contact the University's Office for Technology Transfer and Industry Collaboration. All work owned by the University may not be made subject to Creative Commons without the permission of the University's Office for Technology Transfer and Industry Collaboration.

Non-faculty staff at Tufts assign their copyrighted works to the University as works made for hire. Non-faculty staff who wish to place Tufts works under a CC may apply to the University's Office for Technology Transfer and Industry Collaboration for its permission, using the attached form.
